## **The Roles of Science and Technology in Winning (or Not Winning) WWII**

World War II is well known for the innovative application of science to the development of such important technologies as the atomic bomb, cryptology, aeronautics, rocketry, radar, and electronic computing. These, and several others, did much to help decide a world war that critically depended on the national industrial and technological capabilities of the five principal combatants (the United States, Nazi Germany, Great Britain, the Soviet Union, and Imperial Japan). We will examine the histories of and impediments to development and deployment, the competition between the major combatant nations, what these technologies did or did not do to make a difference during World War II, and how they set the course of the Cold War.
